CATEGORY	CHILD'S APPEARANCE	CHILD'S BEHAVIOR	CARETAKER'S BEHAVIOR
Physical abuse	 Unexplained injuries, especially those located on parts of the body not usually affected by normal childhood activities, i.e., eyes, mouth, lips, gums, back, thighs, buttocks, genital areas. Repeated injuries such as bruises, welts, or burns. Bruises and welts in various stages of healing; on large areas of the torso, back, buttocks, or thigh; in unusual patterns, clustered, or reflective of the instrument used to inflict them; on several different surface areas. Small circular burns (cigar or cigarette) often found on forearms, hands, buttocks, or soles of the feet; glove or sock-like burns of the feet or doughnut shaped burns on the buttocks or genitalia indicative of immersion in hot liquid; burns caused by friction, usually found on arms, neck, legs or torso indicating a rope or cord may have been used to tie up the victim; patterned burns that show the shape of the item (iron, grill) used to inflict them. Unexplained fractures (skull, jaw, nose, face, ribs, legs, arms); spiral fractures of the long bones; fractures in various stages of healing; multiple fractures; any fracture in a child < two. Human bite marks. 	Wary of physical contact with adults. Apprehensive when other children cry. Demonstrates extremes in behavior, i.e. extremely hyperactive, disruptive or aggressive or complacent, shy, withdrawn, or uncommunicative. Seems frightened of parents. Reports injury by parents.	Has a history of abuse as a child. Uses harsh discipline inappropriate to child's age, transgression and condition. Offers illogical, unconvincing, contradictory or no explanation of child's injury. Seems unconcerned about child. Significantly misperceives child, i.e., sees him as bad, evil, or a monster. Psychotic or psychopathic. Misuses alcohol or other drugs. Attempts to conceal child's injury or protect identity of person responsible. Denial by parents that anything is wrong, unlikely explanation for the child's injuries, delays in obtaining medical care or inadequate care given.
Neglect	 Consistently dirty, unwashed, hungry, or inadequately clothed. Appears poorly nourished. Without supervision for extended periods of time or placed in dangerous situations. Constantly tired or listless. Either a consistent lack of good hygiene, or an obsession with cleanliness. Has unattended physical problems or lacks routine medical care. Is exploited, overworked, or kept from attending school. Has been abandoned. 	 Is engaging in delinquent acts, i.e., vandalism, drinking, prostitution, drug uses, etc. Is begging or stealing food. Rarely attends school. Displays an inability to relate well to adults or has trouble forming close friendships. 	 Misuses alcohol or other drugs. Maintains chaotic home life. Shows evidence of apathy or futility. Is mentally ill or of diminished intelligence. Has long-term chronic illness. Has history of neglect as a child.
Sexual abuse	 Has torn, stained, or bloody underclothing. Experiences pain or itching in the genital area. Has sexually transmittable disease. Has swollen or red cervix, vulva. Has semen around mouth or genitalia or on clothing. Is pregnant. DO NOT deny the problem. Control your emotions and believe the child until investigation complete. 	 Appears withdrawn or engages in fantasy or infantile behavior. Has poor peer relations. Is unwilling to participate in physical activities. Is engaging in delinquent acts or runs away. States he/she has been sexually abused by parent/caretaker. 	Extremely protective or jealous of child. Encourages child to engage in prostitution or sexual acts in the presence of caretaker. Has been sexually abused as a child. Is experiencing marital difficulties. Misuses alcohol or other drugs. Is frequently absent from the home.
Emotional maltreatment Most difficult to verify	Emotional maltreatment, often less tangible than other forms of abuse and neglect, can be indicated by behaviors of the child and the caretaker. Includes verbal assaults and the withholding of positive emotional support. "Hit" everyday with words which are demeaning, shaming, threatening, blaming, intimidating, unfairly critical, or sarcastic. Attempts suicide.	 Appears defensive, shy, overly dependent or compliant, passive, and undemanding. Shows overly adaptive behaviors, either inappropriately adult or infantile. Displays patterned behavior that is extreme, i.e., lying, stealing, fighting, or is overly aggressive, demanding, rageful and acts out. May be verbally abusive to others, using the same language he or she has experienced. Lags in physical, emotional, and intellectual development. Carry a sense of inadequacy and worthlessness into adulthood. 	Blames or belittles child. Is cold and rejecting. Withholds love. Treats siblings unequally. Seems unconcerned about child's problems.
